PRINCIPAL CLT SESSIONS

An area identified for growth within our System Improvement Plan is our Collaborative Learning Teams (CLTs). We know that when educators examine recent evidence of student work and plan responsive next steps together, the quality of a student's instruction increases. This results in increased student achievement and well-being for TCRCE students. We recently published a video on our YouTube channel that describes the CLT process our teachers go through. I would encourage you to give it a view.

Our CLTs do not stop with teachers, however. We know that principals play a key role in supporting student achievement in schools. To that end, we have focused on building effective CLTs with principals throughout TCRCE this year. Principals meet in small groups and bring recent evidence of what they have been doing as instructional leaders at their schools. They collaborate, get professional development, and plan next steps related to improving their instructional leadership. We believe this will have a direct impact on student learning, as principals will continually improve their skills in supporting effective instruction for TCRCE students.
