Summer Literacy Tips for Families

Studies show most students will experience a loss in their reading skills over the summer break. In order to limit this "summer slide" it is important to have your child(ren) continue to read (and write) as much as possible.

Here are 10 ideas to make reading during the summer months as fun and engaging as possible:

1.Read aloud together with your child(ren) every day: make it fun by reading outdoors, at the beach, during a picnic, or just under a tree!

2. Have lots of reading material around the home: let your child(ren) see you engaging with text, whether it be books, magazines, newspapers, etc., let them see you reading. Shut off technology for a period each day and enjoy text!

3. Have lots of conversations about the books that you are reading: always talk about what is happening in the story or what information they are learning from an informational text in a conversational way; try to avoid making this sound like a "quiz."

4. Read the print all around you: when going on a road trip or even for a walk in your community, make a game with the signs around you. Have your child(ren) pay attention to all of the letters and words that they see.

5. Children should have choice in what they want to read: many children enjoy reading graphic novels and magazines which are great texts for growing their reading skills.

6. Go to the local library as much as possible: if you don't already have a library card, this is a great summer to take advantage of your local library. You could make this a weekly outing!

7. Take advantage of free reading platforms on the internet: talk to your child's teacher to inquire about the programs that they use and have login information already available to them (ex. Raz-Plus and Epic!).

8. Encourage your child to keep a summer scrapbook: they could write about all of the wonderful books and other texts that they read and enjoyed over the summer.

9. For our youngest children, have a set of magnetic letters for the fridge, or a whiteboard: they can play with letters, make words, rearrange letters to make new words, etc.

10.Try to build reading and writing into everyday activities: try watching TV with the sound off and the closed captioning on, reading directions for games, writing the grocery list, reading words in the grocery store, etc.
