Wind Phone Project

Mr. Goulden, Tech Ed Teacher at Shelburne Regional High School, was approached by a volunteer with the Shelburne County Mental Health and Wellness Association to see if he and his students could create a cupboard style box to house Wind Phones.

What are Wind Phones?

Wind Phones are phones that are set up somewhere in a natural environment, but they are not connected. Instead, they are used to encourage people who are grieving to speak to a loved one.

The wind phone booths that were constructed by SRHS students were placed along walking trails in Shelburne and Barrington, as part of the Mental Health Walk initiative.

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Solution

Over the last year, the NS Department of Education and Early Childhood Development gathered *Ideas for Education* directly from teachers.

From this feedback, a number of new initiatives were created. Here's an overview of the teacher-inspired pilot projects that have been approved in TCRCE. These projects are now being developed with implementation planned for this school year.

Elementary Math Specialist Pilot

With a focus on students in the elementary levels, this pilot will explore contracting retired teachers who were formerly Math Mentors to fine tune math instruction. These math specialists will on focus providing support to teachers at schools where the numeracy data identifies a need.

Support for New Teachers

New teachers will be encouraged and empowered through a mentorship with a retired teacher who will share their knowledge and expertise.

Dedicated Teacher to Provide Extra Supports

This pilot will look at hiring a former teacher/administrator who is highly effective in culturally responsive pedagogy and equitybased work. They will meet with administrators of identified schools to determine which students would benefit most from this support.

Hire Full-Time Term Substitute Teachers

A full-time term substitute teacher will be hired in each county to provide support in schools where substitutes are needed.

Teacher Appreciation

Working with NSTU, TCRCE will hold a Teacher Appreciation event in each of our three counties.

These pilots projects may be adjusted as we move throughout implementation.

System Improvement Plan

Student well-being and success is at the center of all our work here at Tri-County Regional Centre for Education.

To ensure all members of the TCRCE team are working toward common goals, we have updated our System Improvement Plan and are now ready to release the new plan. We invite you review it below.

The plan is focused on three key areas: well-being, literacy, and mathematics. You will notice the addition of a strong and cohesive strategy that will guide us in reaching our goals. We have also included a theory of action, which is focused on short-cycle planning.

Short-Cycle Data Analysis

Short-cycle planning and data analysis is explained in the System Improvement Plan image below, in the wheel diagram. Short-cycle planning focuses on a flexible approach to learning that allows adjustments to teaching strategies to take place based on ongoing assessment of student progress.

Short cycles occur multiple times throughout a school year and each cycle can last up to 90 days.

Through short-cycle planning and data analysis, educators and support staff are able to identify strengths along with areas for growth at the student, school, and regional levels.

When all educators work collaboratively and intentionally through short-cycle planning, then student wellbeing and achievement will improve.

Regional Student Advisory Council Meetings

School advisory councils (SACs) are one way to bring together school stakeholders and individuals from local communities who share an interest in promoting student success in their school. SACs are volunteer organizations and are an integral part of Nova Scotia's public schools.

SACs often work in collaboration with principals and participate in efforts to improve student achievement and well-being by regularly receiving information on the school improvement plan and monitoring progress. SACs determine spending priorities for the provincial funds allocated to support their mandate, including student achievement, according to the terms of their SAC Agreement.

One of the responsibilities of an SAC member is to participate in provincial and regional meetings, consultations, and professional development opportunities offered for SACs by the Minister of Education, RCEs, or other education entities. Each year, SAC members are invited to regional SAC sessions to discuss a variety of timely topics. One meeting is held in each county and all SAC members from that county are invited to the collaborative session.

This year, the key themes discussed at the regional SAC meetings were:

- SAC Agreements and Bylaws
- Communication and Membership
- Best Practices and Roles/Responsibilities
- Student Success Planning Framework
- Short-Cycle Data Analysis
- Enhancing Local Voice
- Regional Feedback and Single Points of Entry for Families
- Relationship-Building & Trust
