Community & School Unite for a Musical Extravaganza at Maple Grove Education Centre



In a partnership between school and community, a special jam session and Band information event was held at Maple Grove Education Centre on Thursday, April 10th. Community members of the Yarmouth Citizens' Band along with YCMHS Band Instruments students joined MGEC Music Teacher, Megan Snow, and MGEC students to play instruments and explore music together. Families were also invited to the event to hear about the ongoing benefits of music education and to listen their children.

The event saw the participation of about 110 musicians, including more than 80 MGEC students, 10 YMCHS students, 2 YCMHS music teachers, and 17 adult volunteers from the Yarmouth Citizens' Band. Additionally, there was support from various TCRCE staff as well as numerous parents and students. In total, approximately 160 people were involved in some capacity, making the event a remarkable community effort.

In recent years, enrollment for Band Instruments 7 and 8 at Maple Grove has been low, and this event was held to provide interested students and families a glimpse into the amazing experience it is to learn to play an instrument and be a part of a band. There is a wealth of research available showing the many benefits of learning to play a musical instrument and the long-lasting impact it can have on our youth. It is our hope to see a renewed interest in the program at all Grade 7-12 schools in the future.

- · Staffing and Budget Updates










Mi'kmaw Student Boat Unveiling Ceremony at Yarmouth Consolidated Memorial High School

In 2022, several Mi'kmaw students from our region participated in the Two-Eyed Seeing Project, a collaborative boat-building initiative hosted in Halifax through a partnership with Mount Saint Vincent University and the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic. This meaningful project allowed students to honour their Mi'kmaw heritage while gaining valuable hands-on skills and strengthening their connection to both Indigenous and Western knowledge systems.

One of the boats crafted during this initiative has since been returned to our community and is now proudly displayed at Yarmouth Consolidated Memorial High School (YCMHS).

On April 23, 2025, YCMHS hosted a special unveiling ceremony to celebrate this achievement. The event welcomed students, staff, community members, and honoured guests from Wasoqopa'q First Nation, including Chief Deborah Robinson, Councillor Tom Pictou, and Councillor Jeff Purdy. The ceremony opened with a traditional welcome and land acknowledgment, followed by storytelling and reflections from knowledge holders and students, who shared the significance of their experiences and the importance of the Two-Eyed Seeing approach.

Following the unveiling, a talking circle was held in collaboration with TCRCE's Regional Education Director as a youth engagement session. Students from Wasoqopa'q First Nation were invited to share their school experiences within the provincial education system openly. The circle fostered a spirit of openness, respect, and collective understanding, emphasizing the need for continued listening, learning, and collaboration to support Mi'kmaw students better.

As part of the original project in 2022, students also participated in a ceremonial boat launch at Kejimkujik National Park. On June 21, National Indigenous Peoples Day, they paddled to the sacred petroglyphs, guided by tour leaders, some of whom were members of Wasoqopa'q First Nation. TCRCE partnered with Wasoqopa'q First Nation by providing transportation to ensure students could fully participate in this culturally significant experience.

We are proud of our students' accomplishments and grateful to our partners and community for helping lift Mi'kmaw voices and traditions through this project.

Regional Science Fair Recap

The 2025 Regional Science Fair took place at the end of March at the Mariner's Centre in Yarmouth. The event showcased the talents and dedication of young students from Digby, Yarmouth, and Shelburne counties.

This year, the fair saw a significant increase in participation, with a total of 51 participants, which is 28 more than in 2024. The fair featured representation in all three Canada Wide Science Fair (CWSF) categories: Junior (grades 7-8), Intermediate (grades 9-10), and Senior (grades 11-12). Three participants were selected to represent TCRCE at the CWSF in May (as indicated with the asterik in the list below).

Nova Scotian universities generously donated over \$10,000 in scholarships and awards. As well, a new regional award category was introduced to recognize the outstanding work of partnership projects.


